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1. Introduction

- **Protocol:** a detailed, agreed set of instructions for carrying out a specific clinical or administrative task.
- Protocols translate policy and evidence into day-to-day actions.

2. Types of Protocols

- Clinical protocols guide diagnosis and treatment of specific conditions.
- Safety protocols address infection control, medication checks, and emergencies.
- Administrative protocols cover admission, records, and discharge.

3. Sources and Basis

- **Evidence-based practice:** protocols are grounded in research and best available evidence.
- They reflect national guidelines, legal requirements, and institutional policy.
- Regular review keeps them current as knowledge changes.

4. Benefits

- Reduce variation and human error in care delivery.
- Improve efficiency and support rapid decision-making in urgent situations.
- Provide a benchmark for training, audit, and accountability.

5. Compliance and Limitations

- Staff must be trained and competent to apply protocols correctly.
- Clinical judgement may justify deviation, which should be documented and justified.
- Outdated or poorly designed protocols can hinder rather than help care.
