- **Adaptive reuse:** converting old buildings for new uses while keeping their character.

2. Why It Matters

- Preserves cultural heritage and a sense of place and identity.
- Retains embodied energy, making reuse more sustainable than demolition.
- Supports tourism, regeneration, and local economies.

3. Approaches to Conservation

- Preservation maintains a building as found, with minimal change.
- Restoration returns a building to a specific earlier period.
- Rehabilitation adapts a building for contemporary use.

4. Adaptive Reuse Practice

- Assess structural condition, heritage significance, and viable new uses.
- Balance modern requirements such as accessibility and safety with original fabric.
- Reversible, sympathetic interventions are generally preferred.

5. Challenges and Standards

- Regulations, listing, and conservation areas constrain alterations.
- Costs of repair and unexpected defects can be high.
- Guidance from heritage bodies and charters informs decisions.
