1. Psychoanalytic Theory:

- **Key Figure:** Sigmund Freud

6. Attachment Theory:

- **Key Figure:** John Bowlby
- **Focus:** Emphasizes the importance of early relationships and attachments in shaping later development.
- **Key Concepts:** Secure attachment, Insecure attachment

7. Sociocultural Theory:

- **Key Figure:** Lev Vygotsky
- **Focus:** Emphasizes the role of culture and social interactions in cognitive development.
- **Key Concepts:** Zone of proximal development, Scaffolding, Cultural tools
